Dan is the Founder and President of CaseStack, a company that started humbly in his spare bedroom but with a grand vision: Creating a Frictionless Supply Chain. Under his leadership, CaseStack raised venture capital and other private equity, grew to about \$250 million and was acquired by Hub Group, Inc. (NASDAQ: HUBG) in late 2018. Dan and the team continue working to grow the business as part of the Hub Group family.

Dan built the team that launched SupplyPike where he remains active as Chairman of the Board. Under Dan's guidance, SupplyPike raised \$15 million in venture capital in 2018, and it is currently working with CPG suppliers that uses machine learning to find new growth opportunities and get to the root of replenishment in-stock issues.

CaseStack has been recognized as #1 in the Deloitte Technology Fast50, made the Inc 5000 list of fastest-growing companies in America nine times and has been recognized as one of the Best Places to Work in two states. CaseStack is best known for its collaborative retailer logistics programs and cloud services technology applications. Dan has held leadership positions at Procter & Gamble, Nabisco, Deloitte, and KPMG.

He received an MBA from the Anderson School at UCLA and studied at the University of London, IES in Vienna, and Kansai Gaidai University in Japan. He has been accredited by the UCLA Director Certification Program, and he serves on various boards.
